Peter Lander alias Pierre Therrien

Born 7 Aug 1847 Burlington, VT of Pierre Therrien & Angele Bissonnette

Baptised 22 Aug 1847 at the Cathedral, Burlington Godparents were Charles Therrien and Genevieve Gendron

Enlisted 7 Dec 1863 (12 Jul 1863?) at age 16

On 9 Dec 1863 he joined Company M of the 1st Vermont Cavalry which was made up solely of Morgan horses.

He fought with his company throughout the war, including the battle of Cedar Creek. He took part in the famous Kilpatrick raid attempting to liberate Federal prisoners in Richmond, VA. Peter Lander, detached from his regiment for orderly duty with general Hancock, served as his personal orderly during the Battle of the Wilderness. He narrowly escaped when his horse was shot out from under him at Ream's Station. Taken prisoner on 27 Oct 1864, he escaped the same night.

Discharged as a Private on 9 Aug 1865. Served 1 year, 8 months and 2 days in 1st Cavalry

Married on 9 Oct 1877 to Sophie Martel (Born St Eustache, Qc) (Widow of George Galarneau) at St Joseph, church, Burlington, VT

Lived at 163 North Street most of his life.

Died 30 Apr 1937 in Burlington, VT (The last of the Burlington Civil War soldiers to die)

Buried at the Old Mount Calvary cemetery.



On Friday morning, July 30 1869, General Philip Sheridan visited Burlington, arriving from the south at 6pm on the steamer United States. There was a large parade and an evening of celebration. However there was an accident during the event. A large gun salute was planned for General Sheridan. The cannon rang out 5 times and was being loaded for the sixth when it exploded and blew off the right arm of Peter Lander.

The General Assembly of the State of Vermont on 26 Nov 1878 voted to pay Peter Lander a sum of sixty dollars a year for a period of 5 years commencing on January of 1879 for the loss of his right arm, occasioned by the premature discharge of a cannon, while in the line of his duty as a private in the 1st section of the battery of light artillery, Vermont Militia, on the thirtieth day of July 1869.

Full military honors were accorded Peter Lander, 89, commander of the disbanded Stannard Post, No. 2, G.A.R. (Grand Army of the Republic), and a veteran throughout the Civil War, at his funeral services held yesterday morning at 9 o'clock at St Joseph's Church. A high mass of requiem was celebrated by the Rev. Leopold Bastien. The Rev. J.E. Pariseau, and the Rev. Joseph Dussault were present in the sanctuary.

A quartet composed of E.J. Beaupre, A.J. Dorey, R.J. Rousseau and Armand A. Piche sang appropriate hymns during the service, assisted by the chancel boy's choir. Mr Beaupre sang "Domina Jesu" as a solo, while Mr. Rousseau sang "Pie Jesu".

Interment took place in Mount Calvary cemetery, where Father Pariseau read the committal prayers. A firing squad from Troop B, Third Cavalry, Fort Ethan Allen, fired a volley over the grave and "taps" were sounded.

Mr Peter Lander was a member of Company "M", First Vermont Cavalry in the Civil War. The 1st VT cavalry was made up solely of

Morgan horses. The 1st VT Cavalry participated in 75 battles during the war. Mr Lander was born on August 7, 1847, enlisted in the Civil War on December 7, 1863 at age 16; was mustered in to Company 'M' on December 9, 1863 and was discharged from the army on August 8, 1865. He fought with his company throughout the war, including the battle of Cedar Creek.

He was popular and well known in Burlington and vicinity, and always was present at every patriotic and military function and reminisced humorously of his service in the Civil War. He had been ill ever since he was burned a few months ago when his sleeve caught fire while making a cup of coffee on the gas range late at night. He died yesterday afternoon at his home on 163 North Street in Burlington, following several weeks of illness.
