His professional career started when he followed his father in 1953 working as a supervisor with National Biscuit Company located on Rose Street in Burlington, distributing Millbrook Bread throughout northern Vermont and New Hampshire. In 1967 he changed careers and became a registered representative with The Prudential Insurance Company. Joe loved his job handling the insurance and investment needs of his many clients. Over his twenty-five year career with The Prudential he established many long lasting friendships. He believed in personal service and honest dealings. During his distinguished career, he earned many awards including a national quality award and was a three-time regional conference qualifier. He retired from The Prudential in 1991 and for years following, was called on by his clients for his advice on their financial matters. Joe was also a principal owner in Champlain Valley Pools selling and personally installing them. The "Pool Man," as he was known to many, continued selling and servicing on his own until this last summer season. He really enjoyed this time with people and was always on the go. As a young man, he loved to water-ski, ice skate on the lake and hike. He trekked with his family up Mt. Washington and all the trails on Mt. Mansfield and Camel's Hump. In the winter he cross-country skied and was a winner in the Stowe Derby for the "Over 60" aged skiers. In his later years, Joe worked out and ran daily, and ran in local 5K races regularly with his daughters and grandchildren. Joe loved trains. For Christmas, his wife Peg gave him an H O gauge train set and the hobby took off. Many children came to see his layouts. His grandchildren spent many happy hours playing trains at Grandpa's house and developed their own interest in trains. Joe went to shows and traveled the country chasing and photographing trains. His hobby grew to a passion and more than a part-time job. Joe was a conductor on the Lamoille Valley Railroad for many years, taking tickets, narrating the tour, dancing in the aisle, painting and repairing the cars, and clearing brush on the track. He was also a conductor and handled daily cash operations on the Champlain Flyer. Joe was an ambassador for Operation Lifesaver. He spoke and showed safety videotapes to schoolchildren in VT and NY. He also served as a commissioner with the CCTA. He was a member of the B.P.O.E. and past member of the Knights of Columbus. Joe was a long time member of the St. Anthony's choir and was the former director of the St. Anthony's folk group
